Housing remains out of reach for thousands of people with intellectual disabilities across Canada.

The demand for accessible, supportive, and subsidized disability housing consistently outstrips supply. Most provinces do not have a centralized waiting list, but the few figures available from existing lists vary from **500+** people in Nova Scotia to **28,000+** people in Ontario. Wait times depend on specific programs or the availability of general subsidized affordable housing and often exceed 3 years.

Public Engagement and Social Policy

Grounded in the belief that the experience and leadership of people with intellectual disabilities are essential, this year's national projects and partnerships created opportunities for them to take on stronger roles in community life, public engagement, and social policy, shaping decisions, tools, research, and public conversations that affect us all.

Voice and Choice

L'Arche Canada's leadership and shared decision-making practice continued to help people express themselves, listen deeply, and act together to build trust and inclusion. Through accessible learning and practical experience, people with intellectual disabilities and support assistants developed skills to communicate choices, participate in decisions, and exercise leadership in community life.

The Participation Pathway

The Participation Pathway identifies the knowledge, experience, and interests of people with intellectual disabilities, connecting them with opportunities across L'Arche Canada programs and external partnerships.

More individuals are taking active roles in projects, training, research, and policy discussions. Their contributions influence how tools, meetings, and projects are designed and delivered.

Participation Pathway by the Numbers

 - **23** new people onboarded through the Participation Pathway
 - **20** people matched with leadership, advisory, advocacy, governance, or public engagement opportunities
- **3** learning and reflection sessions completed following project participation

Partners in Belonging

Through collaborations with learning institutions such as the Inclusive Design Research Centre at OCAD University and government agencies such as Accessibility Standards Canada, Employment and Social Development Canada, and Elections Canada, people with intellectual disabilities brought their lived experience and expertise to accessibility initiatives, research projects, and policy development across the country.

PEOPLE AND CULTURE

Advancing Learning and Leadership

Over the past year, the People and Culture team, together with communities across the country, continued to strengthen learning and leadership development throughout L'Arche Canada.

A major milestone was the successful implementation and expansion of the Learning Management System (LMS) via our new service provider ADP. This system now hosts more than a hundred courses developed by L'Arche at the national, regional and community levels, while also providing employees and volunteers with access to thousands of external learning resources. Together, these offerings create new opportunities for ongoing professional and personal development.

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The New Community Leader peer group entered its fifth year, providing support, mentorship, and skill development for leaders in their first three years of community leadership. Sixteen emerging leaders met monthly to share experiences, strengthen leadership practices, and cultivate a culture of continuous learning.

Leadership development remained a key priority in 2025. More than a hundred new and aspiring leaders participated in L'Arche Canada's Leadership Development program. Through Leadership 101 and Leadership 201, participants deepened their understanding of L'Arche's mission and values while building the skills needed to lead effectively in their roles.

As part of L'Arche Canada's ongoing commitment to safeguarding, more than eight hundred employees and volunteers, along with over a hundred people with intellectual disabilities, received training in abuse prevention and reporting.

We look forward to continuing to expand and enhance our learning platform in 2026, ensuring that people across L'Arche in Canada have access to the tools, training, and support they need to thrive.

THE REGIONS

Building Unity and Strengthening Communities

Across L'Arche in Canada, communities are strengthening belonging through local leadership, innovation, and partnership.

To better support this work, L'Arche Canada introduced a new regional leadership model, with one director per region guided by a dedicated director of community support. This approach strengthens connections across the country, reduces duplication, and accelerates the sharing of learning, resources, and best practices.

More than an organizational change, it is an investment in a stronger, more unified movement—one that can respond more effectively to challenges and opportunities while ensuring communities receive consistent, mission-driven support. Together, we are building the conditions for communities to thrive and belonging to flourish.

INVESTING IN A NEW L'ARCHE COMMUNITY: A MILESTONE FOR INCLUSION AND BELONGING IN NEWFOUNDLAND AND LABRADOR

L'Arche Avalon is one step closer to opening its first homes in St. John's following significant commitments from both the provincial and federal governments. The Province of Newfoundland and Labrador has committed up to \$2 million toward the construction of two eight-unit homes, each featuring four accessible main-floor units, while the federal government has contributed land valued at \$912,000.

Along with providing housing, these homes will create a place of belonging, friendship, and dignity for people with intellectual disabilities. Grounded in L'Arche's vision of inclusive community, the project will expand opportunities for people to live, grow, and contribute as valued members of society while strengthening the fabric of the wider community.

Construction is expected to be completed in 2027. To support long-term sustainability, the province has also committed \$1.68 million in annual operating funding beginning in 2027–2028.

International Solidarity in Action

SUPPORTING THE FEDERATION AROUND THE WORLD

L'Arche is a global network of relationships, connecting communities across cultures, languages, and realities. Through international solidarity, we share resources and support one another so all can flourish—especially in times of hardship.

Over the past year, communities across the federation faced significant challenges, including economic instability, food insecurity, political unrest, and war. International solidarity funds include both designated gifts for specific projects or countries and flexible contributions that can be directed to the most urgent needs.

Together, Canadian communities and the L'Arche Canada Foundation raised **\$498,000** to support communities around the world.

- **Canadian communities: \$164,000**
- **L'Arche Canada Foundation: \$334,000**

These funds helped sustain essential services, strengthen local capacity, and respond to emerging needs across the federation.



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WHERE SOLIDARITY MADE AN IMPACT IN 2025–2026

International Solidarity funding supported communities in Egypt, Bethlehem, Haiti, India, the Dominican Republic, Honduras, Côte d'Ivoire, Uganda, Mexico, and Ukraine. Flexible international gifts also enabled support to be directed where needs were greatest.

SPOTLIGHT: L'ARCHE HONDURAS

Progress continued on a new home in Tegucigalpa, bringing the community closer to a long-held dream. Although delays in the sale of the former house created a funding gap and postponed the move, L'Arche Honduras and L'Arche International worked closely together to keep the project moving forward and minimize disruptions for community members awaiting their new home.

Across the federation, solidarity is both practical and relational—expressed through financial support, shared learning, and a commitment to ensure that no community stands alone.

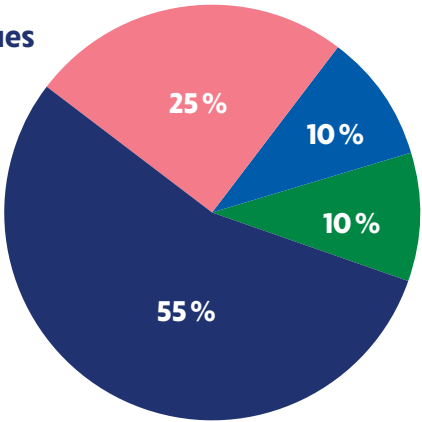

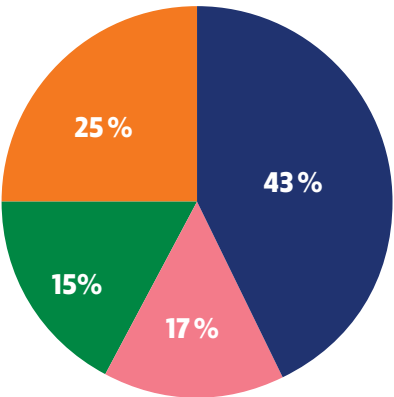
Consolidated L'Arche Canada and L'Arche Canada Foundation Revenues
